Texas Department of Agriculture To Host Roundtable

The Texas Department of Agriculture CDBG team is re-designing the economic development program (*the former Texas*

Capital Fund) to better address the diverse economic development priorities of rural Texas. While details are still being finalized, below is a high-level overview of the proposed programs:

 The RED - Strategy Program provides grant funding to assess the current and long-term community needs, recommend business retention & expansion strategies and identify potential projects and funding sources



to support sustainable and strategic economic growth.

• The RED - Project Program provides construction/implementation grants to fund projects identified in the community's economic development plan. More flexible than the Texas Capital Fund, a RED -Project can meet any of HUD's National objectives including - LMI job creation, provide goods/services, job training, removal of slum and blight or micro-enterprise support.

Duncan: Texas Counties Must Band Together to Present Legislative Needs

Going into the next session of the Texas Legislature, things will be different, and likely "even more of a challenge than it has been in the past" for county officials, said former state senator Robert Duncan in a speech Tuesday, October 5th.

Duncan, who served in the Legislature for more than two decades, first in the House of Representatives and later in the state Senate, spoke to an auditorium full of socially-distanced attendees at Abilene Convention Center to launch the 98th Annual County Judges and Commissioners Association of Texas Conference.



County judges and county commissioners are opinion leaders, especially in rural counties, said Duncan, also former chancellor of the Texas Tech University System

Duncan said he remains hopeful that the legislative process still reflects that the state and counties are partners, whether "red or blue."

There is no one size fits all in a state like Texas, he said.

Robert Duncan gave the keynote address Tuesday morning. The 98th Annual County Judges and Commissioners Association of Texas Conference goes through Thursday. "We're very fortunate that we have local control, I believe, in our counties," he said, having a hand on the pulse of issues such as jail standards, law enforcement, mental health issues, child welfare, and similar topics.

Clear communication with state legislators, then, is "critical to your success," he told attendees at the convention, which has brought about 400 people to Abilene.

This is precisely why the Texas Midwest Community Network was formed back in 1994 and why it continues to be important that we stand and band together to bring rural issues to the forefront.

Legislative Update - November Ballot & Special Election



November Ballot

Texas State Senate

Incumbent Charles Perry District 28 is running unopposed while Incumbent Dawn Buckingham (Rep) faces Clayton Tucker (Dem) for the District 24 seat.

Texas House of Representatives

Shelby Slawson, District 59; Glenn Rogers, District 60;

Incumbent James Frank, District 69; and, Incumbent Drew Darby, District 72, are all running unopposed. Incumbent Andrew Murr (Rep) will face Joe P. Herrera (Dem) in District 53; Incumbent Drew Springer (Rep) will face Patsy Ledbetter (Dem) in District 68; Incumbent Stan Lambert (Rep) will face Sam Hutton (Dem) in District 71; and Incumbent Dustin Burrows (Rep) will face Addison Perry-Franks (Dem) in District 83. *Early voting for the November 3rd Election will begin on October 13th and end on October 30th.*

Special Election - Senate District 30

The runoff in the Texas State Senate Special Election between Shelley Luther and Republican State Representative Drew Springer will be held on December 19th, Gov. Greg Abbott announced on October 10th. *Early voting for Senate District 30 will begin December 9th.*

Luther and Springer were the top two vote-getters in a Special Election on September 29th for the seat which became open when State Senator Pat Fallon was nominated by Republicans in Congressional District 4 after John Ratcliffe resigned to join the Trump administration.

Olam Edible Nuts is a nut facility located

in Dublin that produces and processes many kinds of nuts including peanuts, almonds, cashews, walnuts and more, but what makes this facility interesting is where these nuts end up. Customize Your Email

The facility dry roasts nuts for many different companies including Hershey, Nestle and General Mills, but for the Payday bar, Olam Edible Nuts is the only facility that dry roasts the nuts for the bar.

Jackie Gailey, the plant manager at Olam Edible Nuts, explains the history of dry roasting nuts for the Payday bar.

"We have been roasting the Payday bar since 2000. At the time it was strictly for the Payday



bar but it has grown to [other companies.] We do all kinds of roasting for different companies, but the Payday bar is exclusive to this plant here in Dublin. We're the only facility that roasts these peanuts for the Payday bar so every bar that you eat came from here," Gailey said.

The peanuts have to be blanched first which is the removal of the red skin from the peanut and that is done through a heating and cooling process while the peanut is still raw.

Then, the peanuts are dry roasted. Dry roasting takes about three hours to do a truckload of peanuts.

After the peanuts are dry roasted, they are shipped out to the Hershey Robinson plant where the Payday bar is made.

Gailey says there are four other Olam Edible Nut facilities in the United States. There is a blanching facility in Blakely, Georgia, a blanching facility in Sylvester, Georgia and a roasting facility in Edenton, North Carolina.

"Our plant here in Dublin is the only multi-purpose plant. We actually do blanched peanuts which means that we remove the red skin from them or we can roast either one so we do both here. The company originated here in Dublin in 1990. That's when we built the plant and I've been here ever since then. At the time, we only blanched them; we did not roast them," Gailey said. "Most of the shellers around are customers like Golden Peanut that's in Comyn or Birdsong Peanut that's in Gorman. The company started out as Universal Blanchers. In 2009, I think it was, we were bought out by Olam and then in 2012 I think it was, we became Olam Edible Nuts which is just a company within the Olam company."
