A Message from Senator Charles Perry February 20, 2021

If you or your business were impacted by the winter storm, please click on this link and fill out the <u>Texas Individual Assistance Reporting Tool (TIART)</u>. Please forward this information to your friends and family!

The good news is that the White House approved Public Assistance for Emergency Protective Measures in all 254 counties. The bad news is that Individual Assistance was only approved for 77 counties (*now 108 counties as of 2/22/21*). You can click <u>disasterassistance.gov</u> to see if you already qualify. The state is working to get all 254 counties included for Individual Assistance, but you need to <u>fill out the TIART</u> <u>survey</u> so we can help show the White House how bad the damage really is to get your county included.

Your County Judge or Emergency Management Coordinator will be doing something similar for the public infrastructure that was damaged during this storm. They are also turning in State of Texas Assistance Requests (STAR) for local needs whether that is bottled water shipments, food distribution, or generators and fuel. Distribution sites run by local jurisdictions are reimbursable under the disaster declaration.

TCEQ Offers Severe Winter Weather Events Resources

Water

The Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) would like to provide communities with important information and resources regarding your water to ensure safe drinking water for this past week's severe winter weather storm and its aftermath.

Boil water notices must be issued when distribution pressure drops below 20 pounds per square inch or if disinfection equipment is not functioning properly to maintain the minimum residual (0.2 mg/L free chlorine or 0.5 mg/L chloramines). Should your PWS need to shut down, issue a Boil Water Notice,



or issue a Pre-Cautionary Boil Water Notice, please notify the TCEQ regional office that serves your county and by e-mailing documentation to <u>PWSBWN@tceq.texas.gov</u>. A quick reference guide for issuing a Boil Water Notice is located here: <u>Boil Water</u> <u>Notice Guide</u>.

As a result of Governor Abbott's declaration that extensive review of ERCOT as an emergency item, House Speaker Dade Phelan requested a joint session of the House State Affairs and Energy Resources Committees, and a <u>public hearing</u> has been set for Thursday, Feb. 25, at 9 a.m. You can access a livestream of the joint session <u>here</u>.

Special Election - House District 68

Tuesday, February 23rd is the date of the special election runoff to replace former State Representative Drew Springer, who is now in the Texas Senate.

Early voting for the House District 68 runoff will began on February 16th. The runoff candidates are David Spiller, a Jacksboro attorney and school board trustee; and Craig Carter, a Nocona businessman.

Governor Abbott Declares Broadband An Emergency Item



During his State of the State speech on February 1st, Governor Abbott named expanding broadband access as one of his emergency items for the 87th Texas legislative session.

Currently, there are several rural connectivity bills which have been filed:

- Rep. Ken King's HB 425
- Sen. Charles Perry's SB 154
- Rep. Trent Ashby's and Sen. Robert Nichols' HB 1446 / SB 506

These bills seek to establish the Broadband Development Office within the Comptroller's Department, appoints a nonvoting representative from the Broadband Development Office to the Governor's Broadband Development Council, creates a detailed Broadband Development Map, and creates a grant program to fund connectivity projects across the state.

Digital Texas - A Coalition of Coalitions

The **<u>Digital Texas</u>** Coalition seeks to ensure all Texans have equitable access to reliable and affordable digital connectivity that empowers them to meaningfully engage in their education, employment, healthcare, and the economy, including in rural Texas where long-neglected infrastructure needs must be addressed.

As a rural practitioner voice for our region of Texas and a supporter of rural broadband connectivity, Texas Midwest has a seat at the statewide table and serves on the Digital Texas Steering Committee. One of the most important tasks of the Coalition was to establish <u>Principals and Priorities</u> to be used as a platform for addressing rural broadband in this legislative session. Community leaders/organizations are encouraged to review the focus of this Coalition including the recently released <u>Broadband Stories from Rural Texas</u> produced by the Texas Rural Funders. Healthcare Initiatives Offered by West Texas AHEC



AHEC Scholars Program

Area Health Education Center (AHEC) Scholars is a program for health professions students interested in supplementing their education by gaining additional knowledge and experience in rural and/or underserved urban settings. This is a to implement a defined set of clinical, didactic, and community-based activities. All experiential or clinical training will be conducted in rural and/or underserved urban settings. Program duration is two years and each year includes the following for a total of 160 hours:

- 40 hours community-based, experiential, or clinical training in rural and/or underserved area
- 40 hours didactic education (focused on six Core Topic Areas)
- Core Topic Areas
 - Interprofessional Education
 - Behavioral Health Integration
 - Social Determinants of Health
 - Cultural Competency
 - Practice Transformation
 - Current and Emerging Health Issues

Students should have a current interest in rural or underserved healthcare and be currently enrolled in a health professions degree or certificate program and be two years from program or degree completion. This includes but is not limited to students in medical, dental, pharmacy, nurse practitioner, nursing, physician assistant, social work, physical therapy, occupational therapy, and public/population health programs. Students that successfully complete the 40 hours of clinical work and 40 hours of didactic work will be awarded an \$800 stipend payment! That's \$1,600 in 2 years! Community Health Worker Certification

The West Texas Area Health Education Center, a certified community health worker (CHW) training institution by the Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS), has recently evolved into The CHW Workforce Development Center. Originally under the auspices of West Texas AHEC and Transforming Communities through Outreach, Recruitment and Education (T-CORE), the new center will offer continuing education units (CEUs) for certified CHWs and intermediate level CHW training such as motivational interviewing, patient navigation, chronic disease management and quality improvement. Additionally, the center will offer training for providers and facilities who seek to employ CHWs and need hiring guides, guides to supervising CHWs, and scope of practice information.

Certification Course

Students must complete a 160-hour competency-based training program as part of the application for certification. Each course covers eight competencies: Communication, Teaching, Interpersonal Skills, Service Coordination, Capacity Building, Advocacy, Organization, and Knowledge Base. Texas CDBG Program Now Accepting Applications



 <u>Community Development Fund (CD)</u>: The Community Development Fund is the largest fund category in the TxCDBG Program. Although most funds are used for public facilities (water/wastewater infrastructure, street, and drainage improvements, and housing activities), there are numerous other activities for which these funds may be used. The maximum award amount is \$350,000.

Downtown Revitalization/Main Street Programs
(DRP/MS): The DRP/MS program objective is to provide infrastructure

improvements to address the conditions that contribute to the deterioration in an area designated as slum or blighted in the applicant community's downtown or main street area. Awards range from a minimum of \$50,000 to a maximum of \$350,000.

 <u>Colonia Fund - Construction (CFC)</u>: CFC provides eligible applicants with grants to fund water and wastewater improvements, housing rehabilitation for low- to moderate-income households, the payment of assessments levied against properties owned and occupied by persons of low - and moderateincome to recover the capital cost for a public improvement and other improvements including street paving and drainage. Awards range from a minimum of \$150,000 to a maximum of \$1,000,000.
